The Pastor's Place

Dear Co-workers in Christ,

Anyone who knows me knows that I am a planner. I generally am not comfortable doing things off the cuff and even the most casual experience will find me considering time schedules and budgets. If you want to make me a little crazy then suggest an activity where you just take things as they come and see where things go. I want a plan. I need a plan.

Unfortunately, we live in a time without precedent. We are suddenly thrust into a social reality for which we do not have a clear long-term plan. It would be nice to have a map to follow in this situation, but we don't have one. In a sense we are creating our own map as a society and within our own circles of concern – like our families and our church.

Stephen Covey talks about the difference between a map and a compass when trying to navigate. It is nice to have a map if you know where you are and you have the correct map for your location. A map, however, has some limitations because it requires someone else to have traveled the same terrain and to have written down that terrain accurately. Covey says that in situations where we are in uncharted territory what we really need is a compass. A compass isn't as specific as a map but it is more flexible and adaptive to more situations. Covey writes: "We are more in need of a vision or destination and a compass (a set of principles or directions) and less in need of a road map. We often don't know what the terrain ahead will be like or what we will need to go through it; much will depend on our judgment at the time. But an inner compass will always give us direction." (Covey, Stephen R.. The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People, p. 108. Mango Media. Kindle Edition.)

The good news is that while the Bible, which is the closest things that Christians have to a life roadmap, doesn't give us specific instructions about dealing with pandemics, it does point to the true north of God's intention for how we treat each other in every moment. When Jesus was asked about the central compass point for Christian living he said, ""You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27, NRSV)

Our Wesleyan heritage also gives directions for finding our spiritual true north. In his book, *Three Simple Rules, A Wesleyan Way of Living*, Bishop Reuben Job summarizes Wesley's mandates as: 1) Do good. 2) Do no harm. 3) Stay in love with God. It is easy to see how Wesley drew on Jesus' words to create his values compass.

So, the long and short of it is that we do not have a map to lead us through these days but we do have core values which can lead us in the right direction without specific instructions. As we decide our actions on the road of life we can ask ourselves question like: "Do my actions promote good in the world? Do my actions avoid harming anyone? Are my actions guided by my love for God and do they draw me closer to God?"

Sometimes the road is clear before us and we follow a well beaten trail. Sometimes we must create the road as we go. We are trailblazing in some ways as we learn new ways of doing ministry in response to the Coronavirus pandemic. But we also have a compass - God's word for our lives individually and our lives together. As you face uncertain days ahead please know that you are not alone. We will make our way together as we move into the future being led by God.

As many of you know I walked part of the Camino de Santiago two years ago. This was a pilgrimage I chose. I walked with clergy friends and their spouses and with my daughter. It was a walk of a lifetime. The walk had been on my bucket list for some time. I prepared as best I could. Even with preparation I suffered many of the pitfalls that befall pilgrims: blisters, sore muscles, discouragement, and the wondering of why I thought this was a good idea. I am grateful that I went on this pilgrimage. I learned many things about myself.



Some of those lessons have been helpful in these days of "distancing". The pilgrimage of the last month was not chosen. I would not choose to stay distant from my family and friends. The first lesson is that each day has its challenges and joy. Easter Sunday my daughter and son-in-law came to my house. I sat on the porch and they brought chairs and sat in the yard---10 feet away. it was a joy to see them and a challenge not to hug them.

The second lesson is that "the Camino provides". While being safe in my home for over 30 days I have read books that have been on my shelves for a long time. I have discovered the spiritual discipline of silence. In the silence I am finding space to listen for God.

Before I left to walk Camino I gathered some quotes for my journal. These were an encouragement to me each day. One that I have come back to again and again I share with you as you journey though these days.

The Five Elegant Practices of Pilgrimages

Practice the arts of attention and listening.

Practice renewing yourself everyday.

Practice meandering toward the center of every place.

Practice the ritual of reading sacred texts.

Practice gratitude and praise-singing.

They have a sliding scale and this month St. Mark's is collecting donations that will help subsidize parent payments and provide scholarships for children to attend.

Statistics show that the children in this area are faced with many challenges and East Tenth offers a variety of programs to help meet their needs:

Early Learning Childcare Center

Childcare for infants and children ages 6 weeks to five years old. The center provides quality childcare, educational activities, nutritious meals, inter-generational activities, and a chance to learn and grow in a safe environment to all children.

Summer Days for Youth

Provides an all-day camp, which focuses on academic enrichment, computer classes, art programs, recreational activities and field trips. The #1 goal for summer is personal development. Last year they provided safe summer fun to 106 youth.

Before & After School Program

Serves school-age children. Their focus is on tutoring, homework, recreational & service opportunities, and drug prevention to help their youth become successful, well-rounded students. They provide transportation to & from school and all-day care during breaks and holidays.

Have you ever had to spend a night without a bed? Join St. Mark's team in helping Family Promise/IHN expand shelter for families in need. You can participate in a unique, family friendly, fundraising opportunity to help Family Promise support families who may not have a home, let alone a bed.

Will you spend a night without a bed on May 2? In your car, on your sofa, on your floor, in a treehouse, in your tent in your yard. Have fun and be creative while helping those in need. This event is to raise money for the Apartment Shelter Project. Every \$15,000 means we will say yes to eight families with children that call for shelter this year. Why? Because that is the operating expenses for one apartment (i.e. year's rent, utilities, security deposit, insurance, furnishings, etc.) to be used as a temporary shelter for a family experiencing homelessness. Each apartment will serve about eight families, one at a time, over 12 months. This event is usually an actual bed race. However, due to COVID-19 the event is now a Virtual night without your bed. Prizes will be awarded.


