COVID-19 Reopening Plan Guidelines

CDC GUIDELINES: PHYSICAL DISTANCING, FACE MASKS, AND HAND SANITIZER AT ENTRY POINTS Continue to stay at home if you are high risk (65 and older, underlying health condition). Stay at home if you are sick, until at least 10 days past initial symptoms, AND 3 days fever-free (without medicine), AND no respiratory symptoms. Recommendations for cleaning and sanitizing will be followed in all phases. For updates check out the St. Mark's website, stmarkscarmel.org/reopening. Current Phase C Protocol

Church Office—Office will be open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 AM-12 PM. Limited staff contact. Outer entrance door will be unlocked for library drop-offs, bible study book pickups, Mission donations, etc., Monday-Friday 9:00 AM-4:00 PM. Appointments may also be scheduled.

Worship—Online worship only. Livestreamed on Facebook or watch from website. (See instructions for viewing on page 3). No Facebook account is necessary to view.

Adult Ministries—Online presence continues for small groups, studies and Sunday classes. Limited live gatherings must be scheduled with a facility request.

Student Ministries—Online presence continues. Limited live gatherings in the building allowed with Adult Supervision. Third Street rehearsal may resume in the building.

Children Ministries—Online presence continues.

Non-Church Meetings—Limited in-person meetings begin. Must be scheduled in advance.

We are grateful for your presence in online worship. Please register your attendance every week at stmarkscarmel.org/attend. Please include the names of all in the family attending worship. Thank you for being a part of St. Mark's wherever you are!

Communion

Communion is served the first Sunday of every month.
Elements for home use with online worship are available for pickup in the church entrance the week before communion is served.

Until COVID rates show significant decreases in our area, the church staff thanks you for keeping your office visits as brief as possible. We still have contact-free missions drop-offs in the church entrance (Door #2), 9:00 AM- 4:00 PM, Monday-Friday.

For your convenience, we have new Grab-and-Go shelves in the entryway where you can:

- Pick up Communion Supplies.

How to Access St. Mark's Videos and More On Facebook



Dear Co-workers in Christ,

As I am writing this email our resident bishop, Bishop Julius C. Trimble, has called for 100 days of prayer in Indiana in response to recent events in our nation's capital and in support of a peaceful transition in our nation's government. In recent years there have been those who have postulated that just praying is not enough to get us to where God is trying to lead us. My personal belief in prayer is that it is often the way that God leads us to further action. The biblical writer lames puts it to



often the way that God leads us to further action. The biblical writer James puts it this way: "¹⁴ What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵ If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶ and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷ So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead." (James 2:14-17, NRSV)

A few years ago, I taught a class at St. Mark's using Walter Wink's book, *The Powers That Be: Theology for a New Millennium*. One of the chapters in that book is called "Prayer and the Powers." In that chapter Winks says that "Prayer is the field hospital in which the spiritual diseases that we have contracted from the Powers can be diagnosed and treated." "Unprotected by prayer, our social activism runs the danger of becoming self-justifying good works." "Intercessory prayer is spiritual defiance of what is in the name of what God has promised. Intercession visualizes an alternative future to the one apparently fated by the momentum of current forces. Prayer infuses the air of a time yet to be into the suffocating atmosphere of the present."

Prayer is not the end but the beginning of our efforts to make things "on earth as it is in heaven" which many of us pray every Sunday. Finally, Wink says, "No doubt our intercessions sometimes change us as we open ourselves to new possibilities we had not guessed. No doubt our prayers to God reflect back upon us as a divine command to become the answer to our prayer."

Like our bishop, I will be praying for our congregation, our community, our nation, and our world. I will also be praying that God reveal to me ways that I can work to make positive things happen in all of those areas of concern. Prayer means making ourselves available to be instruments of God's Spirit in our world. Prayer means being open to confession as we realize our own mistakes and sins as well as calling others to accountability and contrition. Prayer means acting to change those injustices that are in our own power to change. Prayer is not passively talking to God but also listening for God's instructions to be agents of God's power and grace.

So, I do invite you to pray. And I invite you to search your hearts to be the answers to prayer in every way possible. Let us embody Jesus' greatest prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane: "Yet not my will, but yours be done." (Luke 22:42, NIV) Instead of telling God what to do, what would happen if we let our prayers invite God to instruct us on how to be world changers for God?

Greed, pride, possessiveness, fear, hurt...such things can grow and choke out the love that once existed. And then comes the hard part of determining: how can I best love someone after they have hurt me? Do I continue to love them and myself by walking beside them? Do I love them and myself by walking away? Every situation is different and there are no clear-cut answers to be given in a general letter. All I can say is again, the world needs love now as much as it ever has. And remember the words of 1 John 4:8, "The person who doesn't love does not know God, because God is love." (CEB)

Time for Repairs

Last spring when we first began to stay in our homes to avoid getting sick, I started watching a show on Netflix: The Repair Shop. I got hooked very quickly. The show is a BBC production. At the beginning of each episode families bring in broken heirlooms. By the end of the show the three objects are repaired by expert crafts people. The family member or members return and are in awe at the transformation that has taken place. There is no charge for the work that is done. Amazing!



In an episode I watched this week, an Arts and Craft chair was repaired for the granddaughter who remembered sitting in the chair with her grandfather. The artist not only repaired the chair but restored the memories of the granddaughter and her mother. It seems that there are often tears at the end of the show. Tears of joy.

What the viewer doesn't see is the amount of time and imagination it takes for the artists to make the repairs. I understand that it often takes weeks or months to bring the item back to life.

Oh, how I wish that the ills of our nation and world could be repaired in 45 minutes. We all know how long it takes to develop a vaccine to repair the health of our nation and world regarding COVID-19. Thankfully, two vaccines are now being delivered to health care workers, nursing home residents, and the most vulnerable. This process has been faster than most vaccine development and yet it has seemed so long. It has taken the collaboration of scientists around the world to do this.

I think it is going to take us much longer to heal the wounds of our democracy. It will take the hard work of listening and talking with people who disagree. I heard someone say: "most people just need a good listening to." I think that is a good strategy for these days. It is a strategy that will take time. No quick fixes.

The prophets cried out to God for help in their darkest days. "Lord, how long will I call for help and you not listen?" (Habakkuk 1:2a) and in the end the prophet says: "The Lord God is my strength." (Habakkuk 3:19a). We cry out and we listen. Moment by moment and day by day we listen to our family, friends and neighbors.

Like St. Francis of Assisi I pray we will be instruments of peace in an anxious world.

May it be so.

Did you know?

Family Promise is a nonprofit organization, founded in 1994, in response to a crisis of family homelessness. While most traditional shelters separate by gender, Family Promise keeps families together, battling homelessness, while they work to get back on their feet. As the gap between housing costs and income continues to widen, more and more families are at risk of homelessness, increasing the likelihood families will separate, children will fall behind in school, and eventually drop out.

The Interfaith Hospitality Network, Family Promise's core program, is a coordinated response of the faith community that provides emergency food & shelter, offers individual skill development & rehabilitation, advocates for economic stability and strives to end homelessness for the guests they serve. St. Mark's has been a long-time partner and supporter of IHN. When the pandemic hindered congregations' ability to host families, the Apartment Shelter Program was initiated. There are now 20 families in apartment shelters, 20 families in After Care, and 5 families in the Diversion Program. For more info visit www.fpgi.org.

IHN resumes in summer 2021! St. Mark's will be hosting again, one week only this year, beginning on August 29, 2021. More info and sign ups to help coming in July.





In Materiality as Resistance, Walter Brueggemann defines materiality as using the material aspects of the Christian faith—as opposed to materialism, which places physical comfort and possessions over spiritual values. Jesus practiced materiality, not materialism, when he



healed the bodies of the sick, proclaimed Jubilee to the poor, and fed the five thousand.

Brueggemann calls us as individuals and as a church to action: to reengage our materiality—food, money, body, time, and place—for the common good. This study will include a weekly video presentation and ties along with the Social Justice committee theme (page 20).



Andy Stanley looks at some of the people whose lives intersected with Jesus in the weeks leading to his crucifixion. Each of them had an agenda that put them at odds with God and Jesus. If you've ever resisted, defied, or tried to bargain your way out of what you thought God wanted, vou'll

Committee News

Finance Committee

I was humbled when I was asked to be entrusted to continue as your finance chair through 2021 and honored to report our financial position - thank you for your trust; I pray and hope that the vaccines and our lives normalize sooner than later... Regardless, we know that OUR GOD is and will always be here; we continue to be blessed. That does not mean we are not stressed; we all have our concerns. I can report that we, as a congregation, have done our part.

THANK YOU! Donations for 2020 were \$12,821 or 1.2% FAVORABLE to budget as pledges caught up and then some during December. Again, thank you! As I have been reporting all year, we anticipated a decrease in overall giving, which we did experience: we collected approximately \$65k less than the prior year (or 5.6%) and over \$71k (or 6.1%) as compared to the prior five-year moving average.

On the expense side, overall expenses, before any conference tithes, were \$70,765 FAVORABLE to budget YTD, and yet no staff wages, hours or salaries were compromised. This is a tribute to the staff and the diligence exercised when managing expenses. Admittedly, without Sunday services for much of the year and offices being closed except on a limited basis, we could more easily reduce expenditures, but that sometimes is not always the case. It took self-control and a level of consciousness I certainly admire. We also incurred several unusual one-time expenses.

Consequently, we ran an overall surplus of \$83,585 for the year before any conference tithes; as such, we are paying approximately 69.3% of our annual conference tithes, leaving a zero deficit/surplus for the year.

On a proforma basis, our conference tithes would have totaled \$120,625 or 11% of contributions and miscellaneous income. Given the continued uncertainty of the pandemic on church and preschool operations, and the eventual vote at general conference, the finance committee voted to not access reserves to pay any further tithes for 2020. You may recall that the original budget anticipated paying no tithes this year.

As for 2021, we have a balanced budget, and we anticipate paying 100% of conference tithes, even if it means paying them from reserves accumulated over the past years. We will continue to monitor our expenditures, and I expect for expenses to be mitigated for several months in 2021 given expected church operations. We expect to be able to meet all church obligations, staff wages, salaries and preschool staff salaries even if the latter are not operating at 100%. I thank you for your continued faithfulness, prayers, and for the support of St. Mark's.

Stewardship FAITHFUL, HOPEFUL, LOVING



The Stewardship Committee is wrapping up their work in support of the 2021 budget at St. Mark's and we would like to thank everyone who has helped make this year's stewardship emphasis a success. As of January 14, we have the following numbers to report:

Operating Fund

Total to date received: 248 commitment cards totaling \$871,802.

This compares to 251 commitments totaling \$860,730 for same period last year.

Major Repairs and Maintenance Fund

Total to date received: 118 commitment cards totaling \$ 101,053.

This compares to 132 commitments totaling \$121,897 for same period last year.

We are incredibly thankful to have an increase of over \$11,000 in pledging for the 2021 operating budget. While pledges are down for the building fund, we are confident we will see an increase in this fund as we identify and move into our next building project.

Overall, we want to express our deepest gratitude for the continued generosity of St. Mark's members. 2020 was a difficult year but your commitments for 2021 give a sense of optimism and hope as we move into God's future for our church.




